Through these internships, she helped the organizations to develop sustainability reporting systems and develop sustainability action plans. Additionally, she coauthored of RIT's most recent Climate Action Plan and took the lead on the development of the climate resilience section of the plan.



2018-2019 Baylee Ritter is a senior at DePaul University, double majoring in Public Relations & Advertising and Communication Studies and minoring in Environmental Communication. As one of the founders of the Prescription Pill and Drug Disposal Program (P2D2), she has worked around the world to dispose of unwanted or unused prescription medication. The program is currently in 28 states and 6 countries and has disposed of over 4.5 million pounds of medication. In 2011, she wrote a piece of legislation that has generated over \$250,000. This money will be used in the state of Illinois to help facilitate medication disposal in communities. Since then, Baylee has continued to create programs designed to bring awareness to growing environmental issues. In 2017, Baylee was a guest speaker at the United Nations General Assembly in New York. She spoke on the harm of single-use plastics during the high-level side event called "The Ocean - a wealth of opportunities" on behalf of the World Oceans Day Youth Advisory Council, which she is a member.
